TRANSMISSIBLE SPONGIFORM ENCEPHALOPATHIES

1. Screening for possible CJD prior to surgery or endoscopy

The main implication for NHS Borders regarding Transmissible Spongiform Encephalopathies including CJD and vCJD is the screening of patients undergoing surgical procedures and endoscopy in order that the re-useable devices involved in the procedures are appropriately managed.

This screening is carried out by asking all patients about to undergo any elective or emergency surgical or endoscopic procedure:

"Have you ever been notified that you are at increased risk of CJD or vCJD for public health purposes?"
