Request

A) Rehabilitation

- To provide all plans of deployment methods for rehabilitation resources for stroke patients?
- To provide information on how the Health board will ensure that stroke patients are given the opportunity to achieve their full recovery potential
- To provide all current plans that will develop and build capability for stroke rehabilitation over the next 1 year and 5 years?

Response

- There is a designated stroke ward within BGH where the rehabilitation process is commenced by all Allied Health Professionals (AHPS- Physiotherapists and Occupational Therapist). There are options to continue the rehabilitation journey within a variety of care settings including community hospitals, day hospitals, Transitional Care facilities, and a community rehab team. There is also close collaboration with social care partners, 3rd sector in particular Chest Heart & Stroke Association, Stroke Association and our tertiary partners for example SMART/Astley Ainslie Hospital services in Lothian.
- NHS Borders has a Community Health Team in the Cheviot Locality that provides rehabilitation locally.
 Patients within the other localities have referrals made to the BGH service. Patients can also refer themselves to the Physiotherapy Service
- Provision of Exercise after Stroke and Community Stroke Rehabilitation Services remains a difficult issue
 due to the rurality of the Borders. Although there are not stroke specific services the rehabilitation teams
 in all areas of the Borders are aware of referrals pathways and the resources that are available. They
 are principally Day Hospital rehabilitation, shared exercise programs with cardiac and respiratory
 patients, LIVE Borders gyms and third sector organisations.
- NHS Borders is focussing on building capacity for all staff to ensure that they have the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary to deliver high quality services. Scottish Stroke Care Audit data, which informs the Scottish Stroke Improvement Plan, is used to identify where improvement is required.
- NHS Borders is currently pursuing the following actions to improve the service in respect of patients transitioning to the community.
- Access to Stroke Therapy: Enhancing Speech and Language Therapy input consistently by day 3
 post stroke
- Access to stroke rehab services: Improvements here would include improved early supported discharge.
- Goal Setting: National goal setting workshops exist and these will be delivered for community hospitals and AHPs to ensure consistency of approach in Border's Hospitals.
- Access to Specialist Clinical Neuro-psychological Services: This is a challenging area for NHS
 Borders given lack of available expertise. This gap in service is being considered as part of planning in
 respect of developing services locally for patients with head injuries.

If you are not satisfied with the way your request has been handled or the decision given, you may ask NHS Borders to review its actions and the decision. If following this review, you remain dissatisfied with the outcome, you may appeal to the Scottish Information Commissioner and request an investigation of your complaint. Your request to the Scottish Information Commissioner should be in writing (or other permanent form), stating your name and an address for correspondence. You should provide the details of the request and your reasons for dissatisfaction with both the original response by NHS Borders and your reasons for dissatisfaction with the outcome of the internal review. Your application for an investigation by the Scottish Information Commissioner must be made within six months of your receipt of the response with which you are dissatisfied.
