Interim progress report: Encouraging applied research in Health Services

The overall aim of the project was for the applicant to work with other interested staff, in NHS Borders to:

- a. develop an informal clinical research community of practice where applied research ideas can be shared and developed and where areas of existing good practice, suitable for publication can be identified
- b. develop an informal buddy system to encourage practice based research ideas to be implemented
- c. produce at least 2 papers to be submitted for publication at the end of the funded phase of the project.
- d. increase the research skills and confidence of the staff involved.

To date (midway through the project) the following has been achieved

- a. An informal clinical research community of practice has been developed. This has initially centred around staff working within child services in NHS Borders, but has also been extended to involve practitioners in Lothian and Tayside as common areas of interest have been identified and project proposals developed. In addition, links have been made with volunteers to help increase the research capacity of staff.
- b. The author has acted as a facilitator and research buddy with the aim of facilitating practice development. In this context, practice development has been conceptualised as placing an emphasis on getting research into practice and carrying out evaluation, audit and small scale research activities. As part of this process 4 projects have been identified that could be written up for publication, all of which derive from existing practice/ work that has been carried out in the clinical context.

To date, 4 papers have been written up and submitted for publication, 3 of which have been accepted for publication. In addition, 1 additional paper is in preparation. The group is also working on a clinically based research proposal. The total number of publications/papers that have been written up for publication which have resulted from the various NHS Borders funded projects that the author has been involved in that include other NHS Borders staff is 12.
