New Buurtzorg model of community care pilots in Coldstream.

Over 40 delegates attended the Buurtzorg in the Borders session this month at Tweed Horizons, near Newtown St Boswells.

Buurtzorg (pronounced 'boort zorg') was developed in the Netherlands to put the focus on the needs of the patient, promoting selfmanagement and good quality care at home.

The Buurtzorg model uses self-managed teams, usually up to 12 strong, designed to allow caregivers to be given the freedom to express their own professional judgement most effectively - at the point of care – and able to devote 60% of their time in client-facing situations.

Progress against the Buurtzorg in the Borders trial objectives will be reviewed.

During the course of the one year program, eight interns completed work experience rotations in various settings within the Borders General Hospital including Catering, General Services and Radiology. Interns acquired competitive, transferable and marketable job skills as well as gaining independence, confidence and self-esteem.

Pharmacists graduate as Clinical Leaders of the future. Eighteen months of study by two NHS Borders pharmacists has been recognised by Scotland's Chief Pharmaceutical Officer, Rose Marie Parr, at a graduation event in Edinburgh.

Borders programme graduates, Lead Clinical Pharmacist Cathryn Park and Adrian Mackenzie, Lead Pharmacist, Community and Social Care, received their certificates at the event in Edinburgh.

The event marked the completion of the Pharmacy Management Clinical Leadership in Pharmacy programme, which involved the participants in a structured framework of twelve taught days, made up of eight single days and two two-day residential courses. A further core part of the programme was the completion, by each of the pharmacists, of a mentored workplace-based healthcare improvement project.

Based in the Tweeddale area, Lynn has worked as a Community Nurse for NHS Borders for 13 years, prior to undertaking her postgraduate studies at QMU.



Engagement events were hosted at local amenities, groups and events such as Langlee Carnival, Borders College Fresher's Week and Bump to Baby groups.





Hosted by Claire Pearce, Director of Nursing, Midwifery & Acute Services, the theme was 'Excellence in Care' and the programme for the day was packed full of informative, interesting and inspiring presentations delivered by guest speakers from NHS Borders, Fife, Lothian, Scottish Government, the Royal College of Nursing and Care Opinion Scotland.

The then Macmillan Nurse Consultant for Cancer in NHS Borders, Judith Smith gave a presentation about her career in nursing, which led to her being awarded an MBE in 2015. Judith's anecdotes about how nursing has changed over the years, and the opportunities that exist were thought provoking, humorous and emotional. She also described how important it is to embrace change and think about how things can be done differently and better.



November 2017

Our Obstetrics and Gynaecology team received national recognition when they were awarded the highly prestigious 'Top UK Trust for Gynaecology Training'. This was presented to the Borders team by the UK Specialty Education Advisory Committee at the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists at an award ceremony in London.

The award was based on a survey of all 170 departments of Obstetrics and Gynaecology in the UK, which saw NHS Borders voted as the top place for training. We were also highly commended for professional development and overall performance.

The former Cabinet Secretary for Health and Sport, Shona Robison, praised us for making "significant progress" in the face of many challenges.

Achievements highlighted included: performance against the four hour emergency care target; performing well in delivering elective access targets and standards; delivering cancer waiting times above national standards; waiting times for Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services well in excess of target and meeting all financial targets.

The BGH Pharmacy Team once again headed to the Scottish Pharmacist Awards after being named as finalists for the much-coveted Hospital Pharmacy Team of the Year Award (which they won the previous year).

Now in the ninth year of the awards, judges look for teams with excellent communication and collaborative working practices. They also look for evidence of ongoing and dynamic contributions to the healthcare of patients within its care on a daily basis.

It was a change in the working approach by the BGH team that impressed judges. After identifying innovative ways to prioritise workload, a new rota and work pattern was adopted which enabled the team to provide a more responsive service and deliver more staff training.

The Pharmacy Aseptic Team provide timely treatment to patients and meet national treatment targets which was also recognised by the judges.
