

## Freedom of Information request 47-22

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### Request

I would like to request the following information with regards to primary rebates schemes that have been signed by your CCG/ Board in the past 12 months.

1. Are there any signed for any of the following products, and if so , which ones:

Insulins (basal, bolus and premix)

GLP-1 (i.e Trulicity)

DPP-IV (i.e Januvia or Onglyza)

SGLT-2 (I.e Invokana)

Growth Hormones (norditropin; omnitrope; Genotropin; humatrope; nutropinAq; Saizen)

2. What are the start and finish dates (or ongoing if open ended)?

3. Which rebates are independent? or are they aligned to PrescQIPP?

4. What is the total number of primary rebate schemes (any included) that your CCG/ Board has signed?

### Response

Primary Care Rebate Schemes (PCRS) are reviewed and evaluated by National Services Scotland. The request for a review should include your name and address for correspondence, the request for information to which the request relates and the issue which you wish to be reviewed. Please state the reference number **47-22** on this request. Your request should be made within 40 working days from receipt of this letter.

If following this review, you remain dissatisfied with the outcome, you may appeal to the Scottish Information Commissioner and request an investigation of your complaint. Your request to the Scottish Information Commissioner should be in writing (or other permanent form), stating your name and an address for correspondence. You should provide the details of the request and your reasons for dissatisfaction with both the original response by NHS Borders and your reasons for dissatisfaction with the outcome of the internal review. Your application for an investigation by the Scottish Information Commissioner must be made within six months of your receipt of the response with which you are dissatisfied.
