### Response

This information is not held by NHS Borders, as defined in Section 17, Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002.

However, under Section 15 Duty to Provide Advice and Assistance, please find attached nationally available data for 2016/17 onwards to August 2022. Tab 1 – Summary shows occupied beds days selected for Borders and over 18s and the average cases. Row 16 on the first summary tab is what is required to work out the costs when combined with the cost per case data. Also attached is a copy of the delayed discharges census OBD's for April 2012 to May 2016.

There is no generally accepted 'standard' cost for a delayed discharge. Costs are typically estimated using data published within the Scottish Health Service Cost Book. NHS inpatient bed costs are costed at specialty average cost per case covering the average length of hospital stay, inclusive of all treatment costs incurred prior to any delay to discharge. It is generally accepted that the cost of a delayed discharge will therefore be lower than the 'standard' inpatient cost per bed day when averaged across the overall number of bed days.

The request for a review should include your name and address for correspondence, the request for information to which the request relates and the issue which you wish to be reviewed. Please state the reference number **557-22** on this request. Your request should be made within 40 working days from receipt of this letter.

If following this review, you remain dissatisfied with the outcome, you may appeal to the Scottish Information Commissioner and request an investigation of your complaint. Your request to the Scottish Information Commissioner should be in writing (or other permanent form), stating your name and an address for correspondence. You should provide the details of the request and your reasons for dissatisfaction with both the original response by NHS Borders and your reasons for dissatisfaction with the outcome of the internal review. Your application for an investigation by the Scottish Information Commissioner must be made within six months of your receipt of the response with which you are dissatisfied.
