Request

- 1. How many prescriptions for hormone replacement therapy have been unable to be fulfilled due to medication shortages? Please break down per month since January 2018.
- 2. How many patients who receive prescriptions for hormone replacement therapy have had to change medication due to their previous drug being unavailable. Please break down per month since January 2018.
- 3. How many women have been moved to hormone replacement therapy medication after being put on anti-anxiety medication? Please break down per month since January 2018.

Clarification:

Thank you for your request below. Unfortunately, HRT prescriptions are dispensed by independent subcontractors, therefore NHS Borders will not be able to provide data for questions 1 and 2. In relation to question 3, please can you provide the following clarifications so we can provide the information, if held:

 Please can you provide a list of the anxiolytic drugs of interest – there are many drugs used for anxiolytic effect at a lower dose compared to their licensed indication, therefore we require a clear list of the drugs you are referring to.

In relation to the anxiolytic drugs, I would be looking for any selective serotonin reuptake inhibitor (SSRI) which is prescribed. If you require further information, please let me know.

• Please can you provide a maximum time gap between when the individual was put on the antianxiety medicine and when they subsequently started HRT.

With regards to the timeframe, the maximum gap I would be looking for is 5 years.

If following this review, you remain dissatisfied with the outcome, you may appeal to the Scottish Information Commissioner and request an investigation of your complaint. Your request to the Scottish Information Commissioner should be in writing (or other permanent form), stating your name and an address for correspondence. You should provide the details of the request and your reasons for dissatisfaction with both the original response by NHS Borders and your reasons for dissatisfaction with the outcome of the internal review. Your application for an investigation by the Scottish Information Commissioner must be made within six months of your receipt of the response with which you are dissatisfied.
