Request

- 1. Do you have a paediatric community nursing team?
- 2. If yes what is their banding and whole-time equivalent provision?
- 3. What interventions do the paediatric community nursing team provide?
- 4. Does the paediatric community nursing team provide out of hours cover and if yes what interventions would you offer during these time periods?
- 5. Do you have a dedicated transition pathway to adult services for young people with:
 - a. Diabetes
 - b. Epilepsy
 - c. Complex needs
 - d. Children with exceptional healthcare needs
- 6. Please can you share any transition pathways that you have.

Response

- 1. NHS Borders has a Paediatric Community Nursing team.
- 2. The Paediatric Community Nursing team has 3.4 WTE Community Childrens Nurses (CCN) all posts are Band 6.
- 3. The interventions provided by the Paediatric Community Nursing team are:
 - bloods
 - nursing needs (except IV medications)
 - eternal feeding support
 - dressings/ wound checks
 - bereavement support
 - home O2 support, education & monitoring
 - social support- liaising with other agencies
 - supplies co-ordination
 - training to outside agencies
- 4. The NHS Borders Paediatric Community Nursing team do not provide out of hours cover.
- 5. The transition pathway to adult services for young people are:
 - a. Diabetes patients are transitioned on their 16th birthday for Consultant review and then gradual transition to adult nursing services up to age 18 years.
 - b. Epilepsy none
 - c. Complex needs none

- d. Children with exceptional healthcare needs are transitioned from 16-18 years of age using the Ready Steady Go transition pathway.

If you are not satisfied with the way your request has been handled or the decision given, you may ask NHS Borders to review its actions and the decision. The request for a review should include your name and address for correspondence, the request for information to which the request relates and the issue which you wish to be reviewed. Please state the reference number **424-23** on this request. Your request should be made within 40 working days from receipt of this letter.

If following this review, you remain dissatisfied with the outcome, you may appeal to the Scottish Information Commissioner and request an investigation of your complaint. Your request to the Scottish Information Commissioner should be in writing (or other permanent form), stating your name and an address for correspondence. You should provide the details of the request and your reasons for dissatisfaction with both the original response by NHS Borders and your reasons for dissatisfaction with the outcome of the internal review. Your application for an investigation by the Scottish Information Commissioner must be made within six months of your receipt of the response with which you are dissatisfied.
