

Drug and Alcohol Support Services in the Scottish Borders

There are three direct drug and alcohol services in the Scottish Borders and an emotional wellbeing service for children and young people. Details of these services are overleaf.

Please note that WithYou Borders and NHS Borders Addiction Service share a referral and assessment process. If appropriate your details may be transferred between service to ensure you get the most appropriate help. Individuals can request a key worker of the same sex if they prefer, and services will aim to meet this requirement where possible.
